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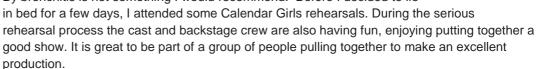

What has taken me a little by surprise (and I apologise to Tim Firth if he ever reads this) is just how GOOD the script is. When I first read it I found it moving, but wasn't really overwhelmed by it. My motivation to direct *Calendar Girls* was the storyline – I love what these women have achieved and feel that we, the public, owe so much to them: we might not even be aware that a development their fundraising has paid for has affected our life, or that of someone we hold dear. Sadly we have lost Abigail Greef from the cast for personal reasons, but my brief despair evaporated when Anna Holmén not only stepped into the role of Cora without any ado, but was also immediately greeted as an old friend by the cast. The ECC is delighted that Lyn Wainwright has agreed to direct Michael Frayn's *Copenhagen* for us in October.

Lyn writes:

Michael Frayn is perhaps best known as the author of the farce *Noises Off* which is all the funnier because it views the production of a play both from in front and from behind the scene. Frayn has achieved equal success with both drama and fiction: His novels like *Spies* and *Headlong* are full of well researched detail but the humour is always there as well.

If, like me, you have grown up admiring the work of Michael Frayn it will have been a shock to you to realise that he was born in 1933. BBC Radio has recently celebrated his work with a mini-season including performances of *Skios, Copenhagen* and *Headlong* at the beginning of his 80th year. From 8-12 October the English Comedy Club will celebrate closer to his actual birthday with a production of *COPENHAGEN*.



His work often raises philosophical questions and this play is no exception. It is based on a meeting between two physicists, Niels Bohr and Werner Heisenberg. The meeting really did take place in 1941 but what occurred between them is a matter of speculation. Frayn draws parallels between the uncertainty of the behaviour of physical objects as established by Heisenberg's scientific work and the difficulty of knowing what motivates people and why they do what they do.

Presumption: A Review

Sara Hammerton writes:

Malinda Coleman made a very brave choice when she decided to direct "Presumption", an innovative piece devised by the Sheffield theatre group Third Angel. The audience were treated to an experimental play, with just two characters to hold their attention for the whole evening - without an interval. It is not a formula that would necessarily attract a large audience, but after just the first night word spread and soon the show was a sell-out.

The play opens with an empty stage, although it is quickly furnished, by the characters, with a table, chairs, cutlery and glasses, indeed everything you would need for the dinner party that we realise has just happened. It is in examining the aftermath of their dinner party that the young woman hostess and her partner start to reflect not only on the evening itself, but on their whole relationship.

The narrative is not linear. Suddenly the discussion stops, winds back, starts again from a particular point, not once but several times, each time just slightly different, each time uncovering a different layer. It gradually becomes clear that the characters we see are fictional characters, it is a play within a play. Suddenly our two protagonists are correcting or discussing their performances, before switching back seamlessly into their roles, drawing the audience in with them.

The complexity of the piece means that holding the audience's interest is quite a challenge, one which both actors, Tania Rabesandratana and Yorgos Filippakis, rose to with aplomb. Neither is English, both are new to the ECC, and both gave very natural, engaging performances, hugely appreciated by the audience, judging both by the warm applause at the end of the evening and the compliments quickly posted on Facebook and Twitter.

As the story moves along the actors gradually, seemingly effortlessly, bring on more furniture and more props, all the paraphernalia a couple would accumulate as they build up their life together, including a sofa, armchair, lamp, bookcase... the material "baggage" representing the emotional baggage. The result was impressive. All the furniture and props had been carefully chosen to make it as simple but convincing as possible, and the whole process was slickly choreographed and performed. The costumes were also kept simple, with subtle changes – a pair of shoes, a scarf – to indicate a change of scene.

Malinda Coleman deserves warm congratulations for her directorial vision in pulling off this complicated task so smoothly, as do the actors for their excellent performances. But the backstage team also deserve a huge tribute. The set was almost the "third" actor in this piece and certainly couldn't have appeared — then disappeared — so efficiently without a lot of behind-the-scenes preparation. A whole false wall had to be erected temporarily in the warehouse to screen all the furniture being carried off and on, a creative use of the space for a very creative and very successfully performed play.

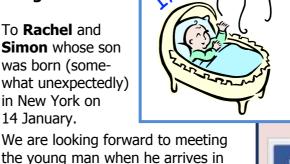

Philip writes:

It is my humble hope that the themes (= languages + the relative prestige thereof; the guilty agonies of post-colonialism; the world domination of Anglo-American culture) will one day resonate perfectly with a Brussels audience. People in the EU institutions and at NATO live these things on a daily basis. It's a challenging text to read because of the textbook conceit, but the idea itself is, I think, accessibly theatrical. Actors have the most fun when they must use gestures and tone etc. to show that they mean something other than what their lines say. And that's also when the audience is the most engaged -- when they have to keep on their toes and constantly interpret what's going on.
